Koori Knockout 2025

3-6 October 2025



Tens of thousands of people attended the Koori Knockout — the largest annual event for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities.

This iconic gathering brings together mob from across the country to celebrate culture, reconnect with community, and compete in Rugby League. Held over the October long weekend in Tamworth on Gomeroi Country, the 2025 Knockout featured more than 170 teams across men's, women's, and junior divisions making it the biggest Knockout in the event's history.

The Newcastle Yowies dominated the finals, winning both the men's and women's grand finals. The men's team clinched a dramatic 25–24 victory over the Bourke Warriors with a last-minute field goal by Kyle Laybutt, while the women's team defeated Wiradjuri Aboriginal Rivers 14–0, led by standout performances from Shanelle Lyons and Caitlin Moran.

Beyond the footy, the Knockout is a vibrant celebration of culture, identity, and resilience. Traditional dance, language, and storytelling were woven throughout the weekend, alongside a thriving Aboriginal Business Precinct showcasing Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander entrepreneurs. The event also served as a platform for intergenerational connection, with elders sharing stories and wisdom with younger generations.

Badji Coordinator Malcolm Towney spent four days catching up with players, families, and supporters, sharing in the energy and pride of the event.

Shoutout to the beautiful city of Tamworth that delivered another powerful celebration of sport, culture, and community continuing its proud tradition of uniting Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and highlighting their skills on the rugby league field.

Pathways to Productivity:

A Creative and Culturally Grounded Workshop Experience



During October, Coolamon staff had the opportunity to participate in the pilot Pathways to Productivity workshop, delivered by Sarah Richards of Marrawuy Journeys, a proud Aboriginal owned business. The workshop was designed to support business owners and teams in strengthening clarity, focus, and wellbeing through a unique blend of self-assessment, discussion, and reflective art.

Rooted in Aboriginal ways of learning through story, connection, and creativity the Pathways to Productivity Maturity Model (PPMM) was presented in a way that was both accessible and engaging. Participants from diverse backgrounds found the model easy to understand and highly relevant to their work and wellbeing.



One of the most appreciated aspects of the workshop was its interactive format, which encouraged participants to pause, reflect, and connect with the material in a meaningful way.

The artistic activity stood out as a highlight beautifully facilitated, inclusive, and non-threatening. It allowed staff to express insights creatively and contributed to a deeper, more personal engagement with the workshop themes.

The session struck a thoughtful balance between structure and openness, creating space for genuine reflection and shared learning.

The integration of storytelling and visual elements added richness to the experience, reinforcing key themes and insights in a way that felt both natural and empowering.

Led by Sarah Richards CPA, Executive MBA, and CWB Indigenous Business Woman of the Year 2023 the workshop showcased how cultural knowledge, creativity, and business insight can come together to support sustainable growth and wellbeing.

Sarah's facilitation was deeply considered and unhurried, allowing participants to feel heard and supported throughout.

As part of the Badji October Indigenous Business Month workshops, an engaging and informative session was held on Wednesday 15 October 2025 at Boomanulla Oval, Narrabundah, tailored specifically for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander businesses and community-controlled organisations.

Delivered by Neil Barry of Indigenous Business Australia (IBA), the session offered participants a valuable opportunity to explore the range of support available for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander entrepreneurs.

The workshop covered:

- What IBA offers and how to access its services.
- Business and finance support available through IBA.
- Opportunities for growth and sustainability for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander ventures.

Participants represented a wide range of industries, including construction, arts, consulting, and more highlighting the diversity and innovation within the local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander business community.

A highlight of the session was when Neil from IBA opened the floor to questions, creating a welcoming space for participants to demystify the IBA process and gain clarity on how to navigate available support pathways.

Participants were particularly drawn to the Start-Up Finance Package, which provides tailored financial assistance to help new Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander businesses get off the ground. More information about this package is available at iba.gov.au/business/finance/start-finance-package.

Building Strong Foundations: Construction Workshop with iCBR Infrastructure Canberra

22 October 2025

As part of the Badji October Indigenous Business Month series, a dynamic Construction Workshop was held on Wednesday 22 October 2025 at Boomanulla Oval, Narrabundah, bringing together Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander construction businesses and government representatives.

Delivered in partnership with Infrastructure Canberra (iCBR), the workshop focused on strengthening connections between Indigenous businesses and the broader construction ecosystem. Key topics included:

- Insights into procurement processes for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander construction businesses.
- Networking opportunities with government representatives and industry stakeholders.
- Strategies for engagement with the wider infrastructure and construction sector.

This was an open session, where participants were encouraged to express their challenges and frustrations in navigating government procurement and infrastructure engagement. The dialogue provided valuable insights into upcoming infrastructure changes and developments across the ACT.

Many businesses were excited by the prospect of contributing to culturally safe, appropriate, and informed infrastructure, recognising the importance of embedding Indigenous perspectives into the built environment.

Participants came from a range of constructionrelated fields, reflecting the depth of talent and capability within the local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander business community. In keeping with the 2025

between government and
community can open doors, build

Demystifying Procurement: ACT Government Basics Workshop

29 October 2025

The final session in the Badji October Indigenous Business Month workshop series took place on Wednesday 29 October 2025 at Boomanulla Oval, Narrabundah, and saw the highest attendance of the month. The workshop attracted a diverse range of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander businesses, spanning arts, construction, security, labour hire, and more highlighting the strength and breadth of the local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander business sector.

Delivered by Procurement ACT, the session was designed to clarify government procurement processes and provide practical, accessible guidance for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander businesses looking to engage with the ACT Government. Topics covered included:

- The Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Procurement Policy.
- Key procurement policies impacting business.
- How to access opportunities and register with ACT Government.
- What to expect when responding to quotes and tenders.

This was a highly interactive session, where participants were actively encouraged to ask questions and explore pain points within the ACT Government procurement process. Businesses shared their experiences and challenges, while gaining clarity on how to better navigate government systems.

The ACT Government Procurement team was notably well-informed and committed, providing generous insights and assistance throughout the session. Their openness and responsiveness helped build trust and confidence among attendees.


