Held during NAIDOC Week 2025, the event was co-designed by over 15 young First Nations leaders from the ACT and proudly hosted on Ngunnawal Country. The theme, "The Next Generation: Strength, Vision & Legacy," set the tone for a day filled with inspiration, connection, and celebration.

#### **Star Power & Deadly Performances**

The stage was electric with performances from hip-hop queen BARKAA, lyrical storyteller Kobie Dee, and the hilarious Isaac Compton. The crowd was thrilled by a surprise appearance from AFL legend Adam Goodes, whose presence added even more energy to the celebration.

Willie Tonga captivated the Stronger Future Youth Panel with Adam Goodes, sharing a raw and riveting journey through his life and sporting career. With honesty, humour, and hard-won wisdom, Willie held the room spellbound—warts and all.

#### Youth NAIDOC Hub: Voices That Matter

Jeff McMullen hosted a powerful panel titled "Truth Telling: Our Stories, Our Strength." This panel was part of the Youth NAIDOC Hub, a space dedicated to deep conversations, cultural storytelling, and intergenerational dialogue. On Saturday, 12 July, the community gathered at Belco Arts to mark the 10th anniversary of NAIDOC in the North—a vibrant celebration of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture, creativity, and connection.

Held on Ngunnawal Country, this free, family-friendly event was part of NAIDOC Week 2025, themed "The Next Generation: Strength, Vision & Legacy." The day honoured the achievements of First Nations peoples while spotlighting the emerging voices and talents shaping the future.

#### **Culture in Action**

Visitors were treated to a rich program of live performances including Dale Huddleston and his Riverbank Band, interactive workshops, and hands-on activities led by some of Canberra's finest First Nations artists and cultural leaders. From storytelling and dance to art and ceremony, every moment reflected the strength and beauty of the world's oldest continuing culture.

A standout feature of the day was the presence of Badji businesses KaBu and Burrunju Aboriginal Art Gallery, whose stunning displays of handcrafted items and cultural products drew admiration and interest from attendees. Their contributions added depth and authenticity to the celebration, showcasing the entrepreneurial spirit and cultural knowledge of local First Nations makers.

#### A Look Back and Forward

The event also featured a special exhibition at the Window Gallery, showcasing highlights from the past decade of NAIDOC in the North. Photographs, artworks, and community memories offered a powerful reflection on the journey so far—and a hopeful vision for the years ahead.

NAIDOC in the North was produced by Belco Arts in collaboration with Yerrabi Yurwang Child and Family Aboriginal Corporation, ACT Child and Family Centres, Kippax Uniting Care, and Northside Community Service, with support from Icon Water, Ginninderry, and the ACT Education Directorate.


